1.1 INTRODUCTION

It is run by Maratha Samaj Seva Mandal's Solapur. It is a centre of higher learning for the working students of Solapur entire district. It is a grant-in-aid college affiliated to PunyashlokAhilyadevi Holkar Solapur University, Solapur (Maharashtra). It has 2(f) and 12(B) status of U. G. C., New Delhi. It offers UG and PG courses such as B.A. in Marathi, English, Sociology, Economics, Political Science and History & B.Com. We offer PG courses (Self-financed) in ,Political Science ,History and Commerce. Besides, the college also offers Certificate courses. The college has a picturesque location, well-furnished and wellequipped facilities. The total strength of the students in the current academic year 2022-2023 is 956. It has wellqualified staff that is consistently engaged in student-centric activities and research. Some of the best practices that the college implements for the smooth administrative and academic performance are 'Organization of Blood Donation Camp and 'Celebration of Gender Equity Program', Organisation of Webinar, Student Seminars. Curricular Aspects

Chhatrapati Shivaji Night College of Arts and Commerce, Solapur is an educational institute affiliated to P.A.H, Solapur University, Solapur. It was established on 4th July 1989 with UG program including B.A, and B.Com In past few years college grown up with M.A. In Political Science, History& M.Com (Advance Accountancy) and with all facilities. The college ensures effective curriculum delivery through well planned and documented process. Academic council prepares the academic calendar of the college and also the concerned departments prepare their departmental academic calendar. The UG course module are divided into two parts i.e. Part-I Theory based exam – Total marks- 40 (Each paper) and Part-II College assessment- Total marks-10 (Each paper) it may include Home Assignment/Seminar/Group discussion/Tutorials/Viva/Outreach program. The Project Work/Dissertation is made mandatory at the end of sixth Semester for UG and Fourth Semester for PG comprising Semster pattern for the respective programs including Viva Voce/Report/Review of literature, research methodology/result & discussion and findings as well as references. At the end of A.Y teachers submits syllabus completion reports to IQAC, which is helps to implement effective curricula. The goal of institute is to prepare students to be skilful in higher studies and succeed in their career. The learning outcomes of these courses shall be beneficial in redreassal of local, national and global developmental issues. However, the skill learnt through experiential studies, training program, field visit to industries NGO, Corporate, banks, historical places, research and village based campaign under NSS developes scientific commercial and social approach amongst student. By last few A.Y institute had started new certificate courses under skill development and add on courses as prescribed in P.A.H, Solapur University, Solapur. The college staff members were put up their efforts in designing and development of university curriculum as subcommittee members in board of studies by facilating the work in syllabus design and also contributed as an admission committee. The curriculum is designed carefully by addressing the recent policies/scheme/ theoretical approaches. The institute management has improved the infrastructure and ICT facilities by installing ICT enabled classrooms facility. Along with these the feedbacks play vital role in the dexterous running of the institution. Feedbacks are taken from students, teachers, parents, employers and alumni

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Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Since the establishment of the institute, it has won the trust of students and society as it provides well prepared citizens to the society. May it be in terms of academics, skills, discipline or soft skills. is not profession. Teaching and Learning is a devotion. The process of admission is fair & transparent as per the rules regulations prescribed by the PAHSUS are always strictly followed during the Admission process. The motto of institute is "Bahujan Hitaya, Baujan Sukhaya" The infrastructure is well versed for providing the healthy learning environment even for the differently abled students. The classrooms are well equipped with materials like blackboards, benches &projectors that assist them in learning. The college library is flooded with books, magazines journals as well general reading books that can help them with their syllabus & inculcate in them the love for reading. The teaching staff is well skilled & has even coped up with the pandemic situations by making the use of different mobile apps conducting lectures, circulating notes & conducting exams through Whatsapp groups. The teachers use ICT based teaching methods, ppts, traditional chalk board, & bilingual approach for teaching. Class tests, assignment examinations are conducted to evaluate the progress of students. Teachers (mentors) pay personal attention to certain groups of students (mentee). Along with taking care of routine syllabus the students are encouraged to participate in research activities & different events that can help them to develop a research aptitude &overall personality development respectively. These activities include organization of conference, educational trip webinars, different competitions, seminars, webinars & guest lectures. Feedback form students consistently taken after each activity or events &changes or improvisation are done accordingly if & when required. The students are also encouraged to take part in such activities organized by the other colleges. The college was already running the Certificate Courses to enhance skills of students. Now, taking into account the New Education Policy 2020 few more certificate are added to extend the skill based education to the students. Being a Night College, we make our best efforts to inculcate human values to make them a good citizen of India.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Chhatrapati Shivaji Night College of Arts and Commerce, Solapur has a good academic performance in the Research, Innovation and Extension. Students from the college have always shown an excellent participation and contribution in the different activities and areas based on research, innovation and extension. Students of M.A History, Political Science and M.Com have compulsory research projects as a part of their curriculum prescribed by PAH Solapur University, Solapur. They start preparing for literature surveys and selection of research topics from M.A.and M.Com II. All students undertaking research projects are strictly instructed to follow the code of ethics and non plagiarism policy accepted by the Institute as a part of Code of Conduct. Faculty members guide the students for their project for designing experiments and research writing. Under the innovative ecosystem of the college, the students are promoted to present their innovative ideas through different national and international conferences, project and poster presentation competitions, and the Avishkar Research Festival etc. The scientific temperament in the students is also nurtured through various science based activities, seminars, webinars, workshops, and competitions regularly organized by the

departments. For all these activities eminent personalities from local, state, national and international levels are invited to interact with and guide the students. Students are also promoted to present their thoughts, arts, views and ideas through the annual magazine "Sanjwath" published by the college.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college is situated on the spacious campus of 0.50 hector with fine infrastructure. The total build up area is 1171.27 sq.mt. There are well furnished, well ventilated and well lit classrooms, computing equipments, staff rooms, restrooms, seminar hall with ICT/AV aids, reading rooms, ramps and The classrooms have ICT facility to conduct regular classes in the college. The Institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor and outdoor), gym facility, yoga centre etc. There are 16 classrooms and One Seminar Hall with ICT facilities. Average percentage of expenditure, excluding salary for infrastructure augmentation during last five years is 2,19,54,261 lakh. Master Software Libman integrated library management software that has the modules like Book Management, accessioning, Membership, Circulation, Book Bank, had been installed. The library has institutional membership of INFLIBNET N-LIST centre Gujarat for sharing eresources such as e books, e-journals, e-databases (bibliographical and full text) etc. The library of the college has made some MOUs with other libraries. Percentage per day usage of library by teachers and students during the last completed academic year . Student-Computer ratio is 191:1. The available bandwidth of internet connection in the Institution is 100 MBPS. Average percentage of expenditure incurred on maintenance of infrastructure (physical and academic support facilities) excluding salary component during the last five years is 2,19,54,261 lakhs. The college has designed policy for maintenance and utilization of physical, academic and support facilities to facilitate smooth and effective use of it.

Student Support and Progression

Various types of Post Matric scholarships, free ships are aptly distributed by online mode by Govt. to SCs/STs/OBCs students and eligible unreserved students are benefited under GOI Rests of all

unreserved students are benefited under Fee Waiver Scheme provided by the institution. College has instituted a unique 'Student Aid Fund (SAF') for helping needy and poor students for continuation of education and to reduce dropout rate. College effectively runs skill based courses such as Certificate Course in - in different job oriented courses. They are run free of cost for poor and needy students. Our college students are really benefited by such short courses offered without any fees. Students enrolled for such courses develop additional confidence for placement through on and off campus drives. The Institution has a transparent mechanism for timely redressal of student grievances including Internal Complaint **Anti-Ragging** (ICC) and Committee **Committeeis** established. Percentage of students' progression in B.A., B Com. and M. A. and M.Com Courses is 30% students opting for higher education. College publishes a magazine 'Sanjwat' yearly to highlight academic achievements of college. Students are encouraged to write articles, stories in Sanjwat. Some of the articles are selected for prizes by the University. The college has outstanding performance in extension, social outreach activities and in sports. Cultural Department has shown exemplary performance with Winner and Runner-up trophies in University Youth Festival events. Students have secured state level prizes in cultural events. A number of students have won University level and State level prizes in individual cultural events. The performance in sports is peaking with higher participation of students in University, state level participation. Our college Alumni Association of the college is registered, and actively contributing to development of college in various forms like donations and valuable feedback and suggestions

Governance, Leadership and Management

An effectual mechanism for mobilization of funds and optimal utilization of funds is run by the institute. At the end of the every financial year audit is conducted to ensure proper utilization and accounting of the funds .The achievements of the staff members are appreciated by the institute by felicitating them. The institute takes care of the staff by providing them various welfare facilities like PF, accidental insurance and LIC policy. Sidheshwar Sahakari Bank provides loan facilities and saving schemes to the staff members. Records of the staff who quit the job is regularly maintained, and also the service details and service books are maintained up-to-date. Management has appointed required number of full time teachers on permanent, temporary and contractual basis for U.G. and P.G. The staff vacancies are filled timely and are a transparent process conducted as per the rules of P.A.H. Solapur University, Solapur. Necessary leave (casual/sick/duty) is sanctioned taking into account the needs of the individual. In-house faculty development program, orientation program, refresher program, induction program are conducted.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Institute had under taken deliberate efforts by celebrating various gender equity and sensitization programs like Women's Day, Women's self-defens Activity, competitive exam guidance etc. Women's safety and security is ensured by CCTV surveillance all over the campus and Three gates. In harmony with sustainable development goals, Institute started several green initiatives also. College maintains consciousness and viability by utilizing alternative sources of energy like solar energy. For energy conservation purpose sensor based systems and LED bulbs are used all over the campus. The biodegradable waste is recycled in 'vermi composting unit'. All other wastes including biomedical waste, e-waste and nondegradable waste is sorted and given to the Solapur Municipal Corporation. High priority to water conservation is given by utilizing rain water harvesting system; bore wells, waste water recycling and maintenance of water distribution in the campus. College has good green carpet area covered by various trees, shrubs, grasses etc. Helping in maintenance of biodiversity with barrier free environment for divyangjan. Other Green campus initiatives are landscaping with trees and shrubs, restricted entry of automobiles, pedestrian friendly pathways, use of bicycles etc. We have with us Green Audit done by external agency in Solapur. Various activities and national days are celebrated to

inculcate the national pride amongst the students like Independence Day (15 August), Republic Day (26 January), Constitution Day (26 November) etc. The proper discipline is maintained in the college. 2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used by the teachers for enhancing learning experiences. Lecture method is effectively followed in the classes. Along with usual black board and chalk method, advanced techniques like, LCD, multi media are also used. The teachers in our college use bilingual methods for easy understanding. During pandemic period teachers have adopted online teaching method effectively and updated with different ICT tools. The use of PPTs, audio-video clips and other ICT tools makes the learning process more interesting to the students.

Some of the departments have visited industries, local self government, Archaeological museum, Science center, with their students and demonstrate the application related to theoretical part. The teachers took great efforts in organizing such visits, with only one aim in their mind that is to provide a chance to the students to get a close experience. Students are also encouraged to express themselves on different issues and topics through articles and poems in the college magazine- *Sanjwaat*. Some students have won the prize in university level college magazine- *Srujanranga* for their creative writing. Few departments follow the method of "learning while seeing". The historical and excavation sights are visited by the students for understanding the historical importance of the places and the people. It gives an experience of observing the human history. Visit to local self government give students experience of how it functions. Observing the films related to syllabus is also an experience of learning while seeing.

Along with this the participatory approach in the classroom is used in order to improve learning experiences of students. In group discussion student participants have to collect the information from other sources and present their thoughts as well as show respect to other's opinion. In seminar topics are allotted to students and they prepare on the same and speak in the class. The Institute provides chance for students to participate in learning process. Activities like participation in conference or workshop, MCQ discussion, general knowledge competitions and reading and writing practices enhance learning experiences. Participation in various social cause related rally, awareness programme, Blood donation camp etc. give them real life experience as well as make them aware of their social responsibilities as a youth and as a good citizen. Participation in essay writing, elocution competitions, group discussion, quiz, and workshop provide the learners gain knowledge through collaborative and participative activities which develop their inter-personal skills. The college has a LCD projector and screen. The college has installed separate Wi-Fi unit for the students inside the campus. PPT bank of each teacher is put up on the college website. All department use PPT and multimedia to simplify the syllabus in a more meaningful way. The language departments use film screening of the adapted novels, drama or short story. Similarly, Commerce and Social Science departments effectively mix up the theoretical classroom teaching and practical exposure through the YouTube videos.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time-bound and efficient

Response:

The Assessment and evaluation plays vital role in the teaching and learning process of the college. The college initiated the continuous and comprehensive evaluation according to the guidelines of P.A.H. Solapur University; Solapur.From the year 2016-17, Solapur University opted for new exam reforms and introduced Choice Based Credit System (CBCS). In this pattern there is 70/30 marks distribution for external and internal evaluation. There is university examination carrying 70 marks and internal college examination carries 30 marks. For the internal evaluation in CBCS pattern students have to give home assignments and test each for 15 marks. From 2019 with semester pattern carrying 50 marks for each semester the mark distribution for external and internal evaluation is 40/10 respectively. From 2019 onward the internal evaluation is done through home-assignment.

The examination committee plan out the evaluation system with interaction to IQAC and Head of the Departments. The examination committee conducts internal exam for the students and the schedule of the internal examination is displayed on the notice board well in advance. The internal marks of the students are displayed on the notice board. The internal and external assessment of the exam is totally transparent.

The university appoints external senior supervisor and the college appoints internal senior supervisor to prevent malpractices at the time of university examinations. The students' exam related grievances are redressed by the respective teacher and the head of the department. If the student is unsatisfied then it is forwarded to the examination committee of the college.

The university related grievances of students are forwarded to the university. The exam related grievances such as correction in name, hall ticket, online form submission, programme code, subject code etc are solved by the examination committee at college level and university level in a stipulated time.

The separate lapses committee comprising senior teachers, senior clerk solve the problems related to examination. If the students have any doubts related to his answer book, he can ask for the photocopy of it. Students can apply for the photocopy after the result within 10 days. University/College provide photocopy of the answer sheet within 30 days. Then student approach to the respective subject teacher for the clarification with the photocopy. After teacher opinion, the answer sheet is forwarded for rectification and revaluation to the college or university. Any university related grievance such as question paper, syllabus, repeated question, wrong marks, missing question numbers are communicated to the Principal and Principal forward it to the university.

Entire examination work is executed carefully and seriously. Within a stipulated time examinations are conducted. So, if there is any doubt it is easily solved out at a college level. There are very minor mistakes such as a change in name on the mark sheet, conversion of CGPA and mark calculation, non-availability of exam receipt, codes of the subject etc. All these queries are sorted out by the administration and faculties. At the college level, most of the queries regarding exams are clarified,

Response:

Teachers and students are aware of the Programme and course outcomes for all Programmes offered by the institution. At the beginning of each semester the briefing of PO, PSO, and COs is done by the teachers in the class as it is one of the inseparable part of the teaching-learning process and frequently it is reiterated in the classroom orally. All PO, PSO, and Cos are displayed on the website also.

Communication to Teacher –

IQAC works as a torchbearer so immediately after the inception of new syllabus, interaction takes place in IQAC meeting to recognize the various outcomes. Accordingly, all teachers are encouraged to brainstorm about the COs, then PSOs which helps to set up the POs. Stakeholders also exchange with faculties and students about the recent updates included in the syllabus especially the cross-cutting issues and how to make them employable. Teachers who are BOS members for respective subjects have been insisted to inform these PO, PSO, and COs through the prescribed syllabus. In departmental meetings, new teachers are informed about these things so that they can plan their teaching schedule accordingly.

IQAC guides all faculties and the administrative staff about their professional duties and ethics which are already displayed on the website. The teachers are advised to update the outcomes of their programme and explain it to the students. Simultaneously, they are asked to explain the course outcomes which are assigned to them. In the Principal's address generally programme outcomes, programme specific outcomes and course outcomes are elaborated to the students and the teachers.

Communication to Students -

To inform about the outcomes is an integral part of each teacher in the initial lectures. It is explained by displaying on the institutional website. Later, much attention is paid to the overall outcomes and learning objectives. Additionally, expert lectures for Jobs and enhancing employability skills are arranged from the respective fields and career counseling for higher education and entrance examinations are the methods of communicating these outcomes to students. Certificate courses are introduced as a result of the feedback to enhance the employability skills of the students. During student meetings they are informed regarding PO, and Cos. Some of the students did not understand such terminology even after an orientation programme, so they communicate and open up in such meetings. We inform our students about the significance of field visit, industrial tour, outreach programmes and study tours which is the actual part of leading towards an outcome. In regular active learning, an emphasis is always laid on the learning objectives and on the above three aspects to shape the overall personality of the students and teacher.

The mechanism includes the parameters such as higher education, NET/SET examination, university ranks, university results and prizes in different fields. The process of measuring attainment of POs, PSOs, and COs is very much interlinked in a hierarchical manner. POs are well defined by the University. CBCS pattern systematically disseminates the values, information, and knowledge that lead towards PSOs at an institutional level. Institute ensures attainments of the above things by fruitful discussions in CDC, IQAC with feedback received from all stakeholders and set the

perspective and strategic plan.

POs-

Our college offers two academic programmes at UG Level i.e. B.A and B.Com and PG level i.e. M.A (History), M.A.(Political Science) and M.Com (Advance Accountancy. There are Six specific programme at B.A level such as Marathi, English, History, Political Science, Economics and Sociology. There are other compulsory subjects like Compulsory Marathi, Compulsory English, Democracy, Good Governance. To evaluate the outcomes of the above programmes, each and every activity is per-planned. Therefore, institute insists on to nurture the cross-cutting issues, national values with compassion through its regular teaching, expert lectures, study tours, field visits etc.

PSOs- The College has adopted innovative methodologies of teaching-learning. In order to understand the specific concept of the syllabus, multiple options are provided to the students with library and internet resources. Add on courses are amalgamating the theoretical and practical aspects of the subjects such as Event Management in Commerce . Spoken English develops the communication skills. All these programmes are rigorously implemented and evaluated by the external agencies.

COs – The College works at a different level to plan and execute its schedule. As a part of the continuous internal evaluation, college arranges tests, oral and written examinations. The 70-30 pattern evaluation for each course truly tests the attainment of COs. A Bio Metric system is introduced for recording the attendance of teaching and non-teaching staff. The website of the college is administered and updated regularly by Dream Technology. The information related with academic admission, administrative, faculties, circulars etc are available on the collegewebsite. The entire campus and the library is monitored by 24 CCTV Cameras. The college has installed 02 extinguisher at different place such as Library and Office. They are refilled regularly. The department like Marathi, English screen the movies of syllabus related plays, poems and novels. Various legal softwares for the academic purpose have been purchased by the college such as Master Software from Nagpur and Libman Master Software for

book management. The video lectures of some teachers have been recorded and made it available on the college website. for the students. Along with video lectures we put PPt on the college website. Our teachers make use of Zoom, Microsoft, Google Meet Application for online lectures and meetings. Some teachers have their own You Tube channels. They have uploaded their lectures and the link shared on Whats Apgroup of students.

The college teachers have formed various class WhatsApp groups for official communication. WhatsApp Groups are important for teaching learning process. Most of our faculty members share valuable information such as Exam Schedule , Home Assignment notifications, Syllabus, Important dates regarding EBC, Scholarship Dates . Students immediately come to know the updates. It saves time and space for all. When the students read such notifications, they get sufficient time to prepare themselves. They submit Home Assignments and attend different functions. There is a good rapport. In order to update all these facilities, the college has made AMC with Dream Technology, Solapur to maintain and update the college website. We have AMC with Master Software Private Limited, Nagpur to maintain Office Software and LIBMAN Software up-to-date.

Our college has two MSEB Connection on different poles. If there is load shedding on one side, the power supply is immediately switched over to other pole connection. So power supply is continuously supplied. The college has MicroTech UPS (Uninterruptable Power Supply) backup of eight hours is installed in the college library.


